WATKINS-PITCHFORD, HERBERT (3 June 1865, Tattenhall, Cheshire, England – 25 June 1951, Illovo, Natal South Africa.) *Veterinarian*. Son of John Watkins-Pitchford (mother's name could not be traced). Married Emily May Wilson, 1892.

EDUCATION: Royal Veterinary College, London, 1889: M.R.C.V.S.; Fellow of the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons (F.R.C.V.S.), 1894.

CAREER: 1889-1895, practised as veterinary surgeon at Camberley near Sandhurst in England; 1896-1898, Principal Veterinary Surgeon, Natal Colony; 1898-1901, Director of Department of Disease Research, Natal Colony; 1901-1912, Government Bacteriologist and Director of the Veterinary Department of Natal; 1914-1922, Lieutenant Colonel, Royal Army Veterinary Remount Commission, England; 1922-1935, Commander, Army Veterinary School, Aldershot, England.

CONTRIBUTIONS: Developed first scientifically sound vaccine, a serum-virus type, against rinderpest with A. Theiler in 1896 in Zuid Afrikaansche Republiek (later Transvaal province of South Africa); took initiative to have Glanders Act 27 of 1898 for Natal Colony enacted, thus legalising use of the mallein test; promoted promulgation of the Natal Act 21 of 1899 which provided for registration of veterinarians and the establishment of a Veterinary Board for the Colony; with a local farmer, Joseph Baynes, built the first dipping tank for the control of ticks in South Africa in 1906 on the farm Nels Rust in Natal; developed short interval (3-day) dipping for the control of *Rhipicephalus appendiculatus*, the vector of East Coast fever, in Natal which was later also used with great success elsewhere in South Africa as a 5:5:4-day interval dipping system.

HOMAGES AND DISTINCTIONS: First president of Natal Veterinary Board (1899-1914); ca 1902 awarded Queen's South African Badge with Bars for services during Anglo-Boer War; elected a Fellow of the Royal Society, Edinburgh (FRSE) in 1906; initiated establishment of the Natal Veterinary Medical Association in 1909 and served as its first president; awarded Companionship of the Order of St Michael and St George (C.M.G) in 1918 for services rendered during World War II.
