



NEW CHURCH FOR MILITARY AT ROBERTS HEIGHTS.
The handsome new Dutch Reformed Church, which has been completed and is situated opposite the Military College, Roberts Heights, will be opened with a religious service on Sunday.

W. Nicol, Moderator of the Dutch Reformed (Ned. Herv. of Geref.) Church, spoke of co-operation between the Church and the State. "In South Africa the Church does not have to face the danger of persecution as in Russia," he said. "Neither has it to face the danger facing the Church in Germany, where attempts are made to subject the Church to the State, to change it so as to fit into a pattern designed by the State.

"Our danger is that we forget about the Lord. At the time of the Voortrekkers it was said that Voltaire constituted the greatest danger to the Church; to-day it is 'don't care.'"

He referred to the letter which recently appeared in The Times urging moral rearmament. "We are fully aware that no material rearmament will ever be a guarantee for lasting peace. How different it would be if selfishness, self-justification and the absence of love towards the neighbour could be eliminated not only from the lives of nations, but also from the lives of the individuals."

He was pleased that young men at Roberts Heights were taught to subject their own will and obey the demands of discipline. It was demanded that the life of the young nation should be organised. No individual should be suppressed, neither should the desire for national expression be suppressed, but it should be organised.
