Not Yet Too Late to Change Design

CRITICISM BEARS FRUIT

The possibility of substantial changes to the designs of the new Johannes-burg Post Office and the new Capetown General Hospital, with a view to securing greater architectural harmony and beauty, is stated in reliable circles Pretoria to be by no means remote.

The Government asked for full par-ticulars and has been informed that it is not yet too late to secure some highly-desired improvements.

The recent criticisms of the designs r the two buildings have revealed for the two widespread dissatisfaction in regard to certain buildings designed by the Public Works Department. Works Department. Among these is the new office of the Native Commissioner at Pretoria.

"ARCHITECTURAL DISASTERS"

With regard to the new Johannesburg Post Office, the criticism of the design is of long standing. Referring to the first copy of the plan, Professor C. E. Pearse, Head of the Architectural School, Witwatersrand University, wrote in the January (1932) issue of the "South African Architectural Record":

"The building is to cost nearly £300,000. Capetown appears to swallow these pills fairly readily, but why should Johannesburg? It was due to a determined effort by the architectural profession in the Transvaal that the design for the new Johannesburg Railway Station was given to private practitioners.
