THE NEW LIBRARY

To the Editor of The Star

Sir,-I read the awards of the British architect who was deputed to decide upon the best design for the new public library. I have since seen the three designs selected for first. second and third prizes and am horrified to find that a gloomy-looking structure without the slightest pretence of cohesion with surrounding architecture is the winning design. Why, sir, the first prize design reminds me of the pink painted wooden little houses I as a child used to build Swiss villages with! Were the building meant to replace the old Fort as a gaol, or even as the threatened new administrative offices at Pretoria for the new steel works, I could have been passably content.

I do not know a single architect engaged in the profession to-day. I have no connection, direct or indirect, with the building trade; I am a mere man in the streets of Johannesburg, and as a citizen I protest against the disfigurement of the at present magnicent open space with so unsightly a structure. I trust abler pens than

mine will pursue the matter.
