THE ELEPHANTS

Comment was made on the fandsome elephants which surmount the main entrance on Eloff Street. One person who viewed the plans thought that these would particularly appeal to American tourists, who, like many other visitors to South Africa, were till under the impression that India held moncroly of the world's elephants. It is truly a handsome gateway to the Golden City.

A point of interest in the huge "concourse" is the fact that by using concrete instead of steel purely South African material will be employed in construction. Furthermore, concrete is the rendsome Comment was made on

construction. Furthermore, concrete is cheaper than steel girders, and the result is much more effective to the eye. In fact South African material will form a very large part of the building. The main frontage will be of ead granite from the Transval and the building will be carried to the top in South African bricks of a light yellow tone, the whole creating a pleasing design.

The estimated cost of the scheme is £650,000, of which £350,000 will be accounted for by the station buildings. The difference in the figures will go to the construction of bridges, subway, track work and the purchase of the strip of ground from the Wanderers.
