A decision to boycott classes was taken by B.S.M. and endorsed by NUSAS at a mass meeting on Friday 17. Students felt these days should be days of protest against the government's new constitution in solidarity with the nationwide drive, youth, women, church and other organisations who reject this so-called "New Deal".

NEW DEAL REJECTED

They reject this New Deal because:

- * Whites remain in assured control.
- * The Group Areas Act and other unjust Laws remain unchanged.
- * The exorbitant cost of implementing the new constitution will worsen the growing economic crisis with the majority of the population having to bear the brunt of the recession in the form of low wages, high rents, medical care and transport.
- * The African People are completely excluded.
- * Despite the lack of real power, the "Coloured" and Indian people will have to take the responsibility for unjust laws made against Africans.
- * The so-called power-sharing will, according to the government, involve "Coloured" and Indian men being conscripted into the SADF to defend Apartheid.
- * Unequal education remains unchanged.
- * Violent police and army action will continue forced removals, shack demolition, detention, baton-charging of students, etc.

A boycott is neither illegal nor violent. Boycott is a legitimate expression of peoples rejection of a racist and illegitimate constitution that will only exacerbate the conflict in our community.

We call on Rhodes students to actively participate in this protest, and show their rejection of this fraudulent "New Deal". The challenge facing us as students is to involve ourselves in the process of change, both now and in the future.

(Questions for discussion by Grahamstown Ad Hoc Committee)

1. UDF Campaigns: Assessment of Structures and Effects

(a) Overall questions

- * how have the major UDF campaigns, particularly the Million Signatures Campaign and the Anti-Election Campaign, and campaign-related activities(eg. fundraising, functions) been conducted in your area?
- * what role has your particular organisation(and activists from this organisation) played in these campaigns or activities and how has it played this role?
- * what has been the major successes and the major problems in these campaigns/activities?

(b) UDF structures

- (i) how have the area committees worked historically?
what is their role, and have they been successful in playing this role?
what role have the different(your own and the other) organisations which comprise the area committee played in this committee, and what have been the major problems here?
- (ii) what have the REC subcommittees(media and finance) done and how have they operated?
have they been efficient?
do they allow for sufficient representation from all areas/organisations?
is there any overlap between the REC subcommittees and the area committees and is this a problem?
what is the role of these subcommittees and do they need to be restructured to play this role properly?
how can any problems here be avoided in future?
- (iii) has there been enough contact between the REC and the affiliate-organisations/area-committees?
what is the role of the REC and has it played this role properly?
how can any problems with the role/working of the REC be rectified in future?
- (iv) why do so few organisations come to the monthly R4C meetings?
what should the role and purpose of the R4C be, and is it playing this role or fulfilling this purpose at the moment?
what can be done to ensure that, firstly, the R4C plays its true role, and, secondly, more organisations attend the R4C?

(c) Effects

- * what have been the major effects(in terms both of gains made and problems that have arisen) of the recent campaigns?, on
 - (i) our communities and constituencies?
 - (ii) UDF structures?
 - (iii) our organisations?
- * what must we do to ensure that the gains we have made are consolidated, and that the problems that have arisen are resolved or avoided in the near future?

2. The Way Forward

- (a) what are the major objectives of your own organisation for the immediate future?
- (b) are there any particularly important areas at a national or regional level that the UDF should confront the state on or campaign around? (in other words, what are the UDF's present national and regional objectives in its direct opposition to the state?)
- (c) what kinds of things should the UDF do or focus on in order to ensure that these objectives(both at the level of building our own organisations and at the level of the UDF confronting the state) are fulfilled? (in other words, given- on the one hand- the anti-election and signature campaigns and the effects of these on our communities, organisations and UDF itself, and- on the other hand, the present position of the state, what kinds of things should the UDF do to advance our struggle?)
- (i) what kinds of campaigns at local, regional and national levels?(eg. housing, anti-conscription)
 - (ii) what sorts of activities within these campaigns should be emphasised?(eg. education, high-profile mobilisation)
 - (iii) are our structures- both locally and regionally- adequate or should we alter them, build new ones, etc.?
 - particularly important here are the-
 - * area committees(this is a particularly important issue for Grahamstown given the history of the Ad Hoc Committee, and we must also consider the issue of other organisations which have not played formal UDF roles so far but which could possibly become available to do so in the near future eg. COSAS)
 - * co-ordinating structures for specific campaigns
 - * forums other than the sub-committees for political discussion, etc.

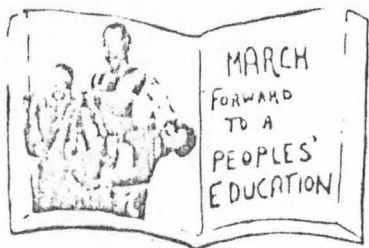

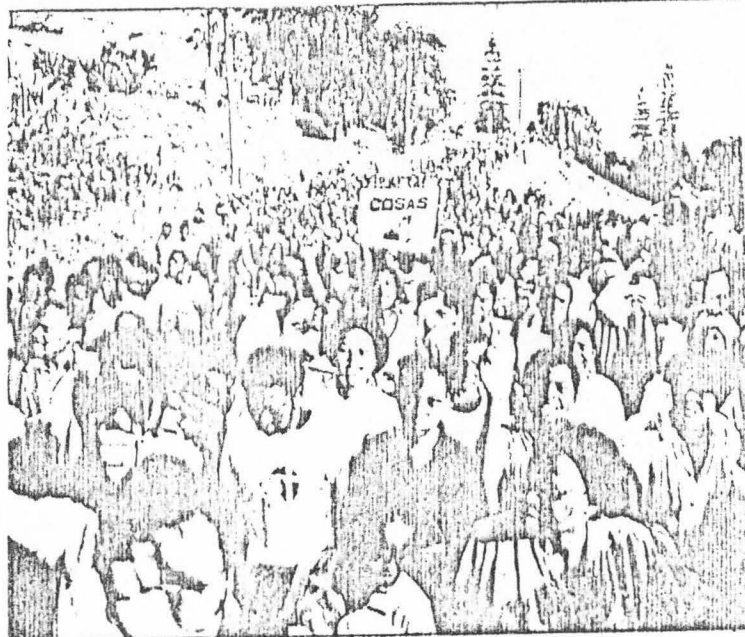


EDUCATION CHARTER CAMPAIGN

In South Africa there are many problems with the education given to our people. Whilst about is spent on every White schoolchild, only about is spent on Indians on Coloureds and on African school child. On top of this our people are forced to buy schoolbooks, and pay high school fees for our children. Many teachers are not qualified and classrooms facilities are poor And yet our people face many other problems

- Low wages for long working hours
- High cost of living and increasing G:S:T: Unemployment and job reservation
- Poor housing at high rents and rates.

OUR PEOPLE ARE GETTING A RAW DEAL -IN EDUCATION AND OTHER MATTERS.



NEW CONSTITUTION MEANS MORE SUFFERING.

- Today students in the Vaal Triangle are once again making the call for a free, just and improved education system.

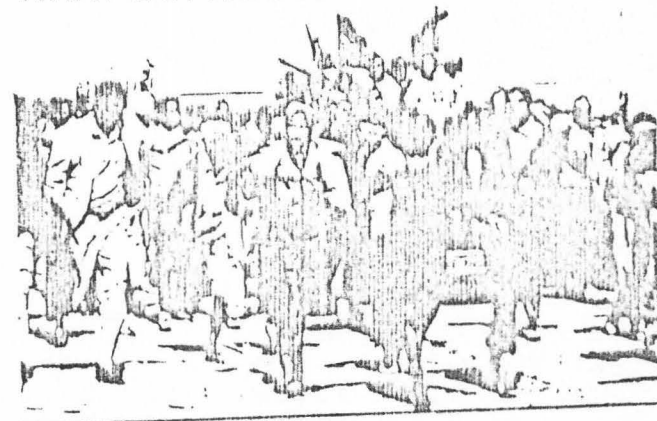
EDUCATION CHARTER CAMPAIGN

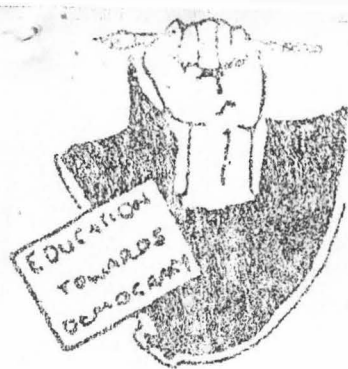

SHARPEVILLE

On the 21 March 1960, thousands of people showed their rejection of passes in demonstrations throughout the country.

- * In Orlando thousands of people publically burnt their passes
- * At large 12 000 people marched to police stations -- 3 were shot
- * In many areas, including Nyanga, Evaton, Cato Manor, Pondoland and Zeemust similar demonstrations took place and many people were arrested. In some cases people were shot.

At Sharpeville, near Vereeniging, the State responded with particular callousness and brutality. Although the crowd of 20 000 remained peaceful, police shot at them and continued to shoot even as the demonstrators fled. Sixty-nine people were murdered and more than 180 wounded. The massacre at Sharpeville marked the culmination of years of protest against passes by organizations like the ANC, PAC and FOSA.

State violence of this kind is a recurring feature of our history. Similar reactions took place in 1976, 1980, 1984 and in 1985. The last few weeks have seen more than 30 people killed in the Eastern Cape alone! At Crossroads 18 were killed, hundreds were injured...

Passes have been used as one means of oppression, control and domination of blacks, especially workers. Our people have always resisted the carrying of passes. Their struggle against passes is a vital part of our struggle to end all forms of exploitation. Many people have been detained, tortured or killed after Sharpeville. The ANC and PAC were banned, thousands were sentenced to prison and many were exiled. In spite of this repression however, our struggle has and will continue. Events like Sharpeville will not deter us. Rather they reaffirm our dedication to fight for a democratic and just society.

WOMEN AND THE PASSES

The 1950s saw a decade of unprecedented involvement of black women in political organizations and in other more spontaneous forms of protest. Land shortages and land rehabilitation measures gave rise to increased migration of black women from rural to urban areas. State reaction was the extension of the pass laws to women who now had to have permits to live and work in the towns and had also to carry reference books. Demonstrations by the women forced the State to drop the offending clauses temporarily.

Women were more assertive socially and they came to play a more vital role politically. In 1951, many women participated in the DEFIANCE CAMPAIGN and demonstrated that women could play an active and central role in the liberatory struggle. In 1953, the Bantu Education Act was passed and the women fought this issue. Their involvement culminated in the formulation of the Women's Charter and the launching of the Federation of South African Women in 1954. At the founding conference of FSAW, the most important issue was seen as the threat which the pass laws posed to women.

The next year intensification of pass raids on the Rand were the focal point of 2 000 angry women led by Bertha Mashaba and Helen Joseph to demonstrate their protest against the unjust laws outside the Union Buildings in Pretoria on the 27 October. The government announced its intention to issue reference books to women and in March 1956, 1 500 women were induced to carry reference books. The furious women burnt their books on the following day and this illegal action led to their arrest. The protests were effective in that for the next six months, no passes were issued to women.

Continued protests and organization resulted in the repetition of the 1955 Pretoria demonstration. On August 9, 1956, women led by Lilian Ngoyi and Helen Joseph marched to the Union Buildings bearing 20 000 petitions which they were to present to the Prime Minister. Finding an empty office on their arrival, they sang the anthem, "Siyoonu you have tampered with the women, you have struck a rock", and left peacefully. In 1957 FSAW leaders were arrested and charged with treason. Pass laws were enforced but met with continued resistance by the women. The last major protest against pass laws in 1958 was in the form of a demonstration outside the Johannesburg Pass offices where women courted arrest. Caution dictated the response of the seeming submission of the ANC which met the payments of bail and secured the eventual release of the women. It was largely pressure from the women that led to the ANC taking up the pass issue.

The protests of the women in the 1950s was important for the development of specifically women's organization in which the liberatory struggle took precedence, but it also reflected the growing consciousness of many women that the removal of racial and class discrimination would not remove all the disabilities which they as women experienced.

The BSM Women's Group was formed in September 1983, when we realized that black women on campus played a very secondary role in student organizations like BSM. Realizing that this was but a manifestation of our peculiar oppression as women, the BSM Women's Group was formed with the following broad aim:

- To unite women students around issues which affect them
- To encourage women to participate in broader struggles
- To develop confidence and provide training skills for women
- To fight sexist attitudes and practices on campus
- To explore the sexist nature of our education system
- To forge links with progressive women's groups and other organizations outside campus
- To ensure the continuous participation of women in ongoing organizational work

NELSON MANDELA
Nelson Mandela was born in the Transkei and studied law at Wits. He was a founder member of the ANC Youth League in 1943 and was instrumental in transforming the political strategy of the ANC from one of representation and petitions to the South African and British governments to one of resistance, rejection of apartheid and its unjust laws and the building of the ANC into a mass-based organisation. After more than 20 years in prison, he has not been forgotten, and is still seen by many as the true leader of South Africa's people.

HELEN JOSEPH
Helen Joseph, born in England, became involved in the Congress of Democrats after WW2. She played a key role in organising the democratic protests of South African women against apartheid and against passes for women. She was arrested in 1956, and endured the treason trial to the end. She was also the first person in South Africa to be put under house arrest. She is still a leading anti-apartheid campaigner today, although she is listed, and may not be called.

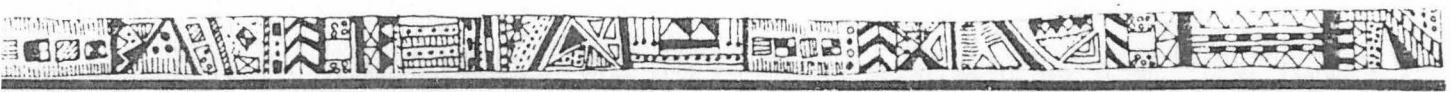
WALTER SISULU
Walter Sisulu was also born in the Transkei and was a dockworker in East London and then a worker on the gold mines in the Witwatersrand. He joined the ANC in the early 1940's and was also a founder member of the ANC Youth League. He was General Secretary of the organisation and played a central role during the mass work of the 1950's.

NEIL AGGETT
Neil Aggett studied medicine at UCT and then became a full time organiser for the Food and Canning Worker's Union, whilst studying at night. Dr Aggett was the 46th person to die in detention in South Africa. On 11 February 1982, a national half hour strike was called to commemorate his death.
