OSTRICH UPDATE NOW AVAILABLE



The 2nd Update to the *Ostrich Bibliography* (first published in 1993 and updated in 1994) has been produced by the Academic Information Service.

This update covers the period 1995 - 2000. The electronic version will appear later in 2002. Consisting of 1340 references, the update has a comprehensive descriptor and author list. Most of the references have abstracts. Its local price is R200.

It is interesting to note some new aspects in ostrich research worldwide. Ostrich publications during the past 5 years include new issues such as stress under farming conditions, and animal rights.

The advent of the Web has also been covered with a selection of ostrich web sites .

Help in collecting references was given by Dr Fritz Huchzermeyer, as well as Dr D.C.Deeming of the UK.

The Bibliography with its Updates is available in the Library for use by lecturers and students.

In this issue I would like to inform you about a wonderful new product on the Internet that is now available. Remember, the more you use it, the more benefit you will derive from it, and the more cost effective it is going to be for the University of Pretoria.

WILDPro is the electronic encyclopaedia providing information on the natural history, health and management of captive and free-ranging wild animals. It is produced by Wildlife Information Network of the UK. It consists of the following:

The Library: The library contains complete external books, scientific papers and documents considered to be useful additional references.

The Encyclopaedia: Detailed information is available in the following modules: UK Wildlife: First Aid and Care, West Nile Virus, Foot and Mouth Disease, Waterfowl: Health and Management, Nutrition of Diceros bicornis - Black Rhino, Oil Spills, Veterinary Parasitology: Nematodes.

Special sections also include: Species, Chemicals, Physical, "How to ...", Diseases, Environments, Refs & Gloss.

For noting: Focus On includes items of relevance to veterinary science and medicine even if they do not appear in veterinary journals, for instance a search on "Veterinary Studies" produced items covered in sources such as Electrotransformation of Bacteria and Injury; International Journal of the Care of the Injured which are not indexed in the CAB International databases.

In other words, DO NOT FORGET Focus on Vet Sci & Med when doing a comprehensive search, or looking for the very latest info.

CAB and Medline (and PubMed) are not the be-all and end-all!

THE ELECTRONIC STUDY COLLECTION

What does a lecturer do if he wants his students to access the study material of his specific course in the fastest, most efficient way? Use technology! But, if you think the photocopy machine was efficient, think again!

The electronic study collection enables a lecturer to put the study material, such as chapters of books (not the whole book!), journal articles and even lectures, on the computer, after copyright clearance has been done. The students can then access it via the library catalogue (Upexplore), using either the lecturer's surname or the course code. (www.ais.up.ac.za)

When this project was initiated by the Academic Information Service, it was mainly used by lecturers on Main campus. Now a few lecturers at the faculty of Veterinary Science are also making use of this means of information delivery.

5 - 7 MARCH 2002

In the 'beyond-e' world, knowledge is the ultimate competitive advantage. How do organisations and companies structure themselves to harness such elusive dynamic processes as learning and knowledge?

Information Professionals are well geared to finding, organisingand storing documented, explicit knowledge. They now face the challenge of doing the same to that other form of knowledge, the tacit kind, that which is in people's heads.

Learning Communities / Knowledge Networks /Communities of Practice (COPs) have been described as groups where knowledge is created and shared in an informal manner. Through COPs Knowledge Management is becoming viable, enabling the Information Professional to achieve the goal of making the tacit explicit.

At this Symposium and its accompanying workshops we learned how to develop the capacity to create and share knowledge, through COPs.

type of work. All works are in the public domain and may be read online or downloaded. **Free** registration is required for downloading and annotating.

Visible Human Server

This Web site from the Swiss Federal Institute of Technology allows users to view three dimensional models of human anatomy. A free registration allows users to logon and fully access the site, but there are some sample available without registration. When visiting the site, you can view, rotate, and extract cross sections from the anatomical models, or build your own anatomic model by choosing the structures of interest. The site works best with Internet Explorer 5 and the latest version of Microsoft Java VM. The site provides how-to files that are extremely helpful for new users. This is certainly a site for those studying human anatomy, but it is a cool site that may also appeal to others.

This site lists, by state and by family genus, the official bird for each state. Detailed descriptions of both male and female are provided, including coloring, size, plumage, habitat, behavior, flight, song, migration patterns, breeding and nesting locations, and food preferences.
