South African universities drop down global ranking https://businesstech.co.za/news/government/264989/south-african-universitiesdrop-down-global-ranking/

Shanghai Ranking Consultancy has published the 2018 Academic Ranking of World Universities (ARWU), listing the top 500 institutions globally, with fewer South African universities featuring than in 2017.

Harvard University tops the ranking list for the 16th year, followed by Stanford University and University of Cambridge, the top 10 list remains the same.

For the first time, Shanghai Ranking Consultancy also published a list of universities ranked between 501 and 1,000.

For South African institutions, the University of the Witwatersrand remains the top-ranked university in the country, followed by the University of Cape Town, Stellenbosch, and the University of Pretoria. These four universities are the only local institutions to be ranked, within the top 500.

The University of Pretoria saw its rankings improve, climbing into the top 500, from the 501-600 list in 2017.

The rankings are based on the following criteria:

- Quality of Education Alumni of an institution winning Nobel Prizes and Fields Medals;
- Quality of Faculty Staff of an institution winning Nobel Prizes and Fields Medals/Highly cited researchers in 21 broad subject categories;
- Research Output Papers published in Nature and Science/Papers indexed in Science Citation Index-expanded and Social Science Citation Index;
- **Per Capita Performance** Per capita academic performance of an institution.

Google unveils search engine for open data

Google has unveiled a search engine to help researchers locate online data that is freely available for use. Dataset Search is now available alongside Google's other specialised search engines, locates files and databases on the basis of how their owners have classified them. It does not read the content of the files themselves in the way search engines do for web pages. It contributes significantly to the success of the open-data movement, which aims to make data openly available for use and re-use.

Google's goal has always been to organize the world's information, and its first target was the commercial web. Now, it wants to do the same for the scientific community with a new search engine for datasets.

As Dataset Search evolves, it might also become integrated with Google Scholar, so that search results on a particular study could link to relevant data sets.

Institutions that publish their data online, like universities and governments, will need to include metadata tags in their webpages that describe their data, including who created it, when it was published, how it was collected, and so on. This information will then be indexed by Dataset Search and combined with input from Google's Knowledge Graph.

Similar to how Google Scholar works, Dataset Search lets you find datasets wherever they're hosted, whether it's a publisher's site, a digital library, or an author's personal web page. To create Dataset search, they developed guidelines for dataset providers to describe their data in a way that Google (and other search engines) can better understand the content of their pages. These guidelines include salient information about datasets: who created the dataset, when it was published, how the data was collected, what the terms are for using the data, etc. They then collect and link this information, analyse where different versions of the same dataset might be, and find publications that may be describing or discussing the dataset. Their approach is based on an open standard for describing this information and anybody who publishes data can describe their dataset this way. Dataset Search works in multiple languages with support for additional languages coming soon.
