What are "Special Collections"?

"...library and archival materials in any format (e.g., rare books, manuscripts, photographs, institutional archives) that are generally characterized by their artifactual or monetary value, physical format, uniqueness or rarity, and/or an institutional commitment to long-term preservation and access. They generally are housed in a separate unit with specialized security and user services. Circulation of materials usually is restricted."

Special Collections

Dates from 1932, when it was first decided to build an Africana collection.

Through various donations, particularly of entire, private book collections, the

unit grew into what it is today.

• We have three main categories of collections:

- 1. African Heritage Collections.
- 2. Rare Books and UP Collections.
- 3. Theology Collections.





African Heritage Collections

1. The Africana Collection

Books in all disciplines limited to the history and heritage of Sub-Saharan Africa in general, and South Africa and Pretoria in particular.

2. Adv. J. de Villiers Roos Collection

Includes an Africana book collection, personal archives, photo albums and maps.

3. Du Plessis Collection (Africana)

Prof. J du Plessis' Africana book collection.

4. SA Music Collections

Includes score sheets in printed or manuscript form emanating from a South African composer or performed by a South African artist, audio/audio-visual material concerning South African performers and the personal collections, including all forms of memorabilia, of internationally acclaimed South African artists.

5. The Struggle History Collection

Made up of smaller collections, all of which relate to the struggle against Apartheid.

6. Various smaller collections.





Rare Books and UP Collections

1. Juriaanse Collection

Dr Aardt Jurriaanse's collection of books covers the classics in literature and medicine.

2. Reserved Collection


This collection is made up of non-Africana books of antiquarian value and so-called high risk books that require protection/preservation.


3. UP Publications

This collection consists of publications by the staff, research units/student bodies or any association/organization of the University of Pretoria. Also included are all publications that deal with the University of Pretoria or publications that were published with financial assistance from the University of Pretoria.

4. Netherlands Cultural History Collection

This collection is the most extensive Dutch collection in the Southern Hemisphere.







Theology Collections

1. Du Plessis Collection (Theology)


In 1939 the book collection of Prof Johannes du Plessis (1868-1935) was bought by the Library. Du Plessis was a Protestant Missionary and founding member of the South African Institute of Race Relations.

2. The NHK (Nederduits Hervormde Kerk) group of collections

- Muller Collection collection of books donated by Prof Pieter Johannes Muller (1854-1922), a Minister and Professor at the University of Amsterdam.
- Van Belkum Collection Collection of Rev Jacobus van Belkum (1851-1933), a Minister at the Dutch Reformed Church.
- Brandt–van Warmelo Collection which includes the book collections of Rev Louis Ernst Brandt (1873-1939) and his father-in-law Rev N.J. van Warmelo.

3. Lutherse Seminarium Collection

Donated by the Holland-Zuid-Afrikaanse Unie in 1939.





African Heritage Document Collections

1. Adv. J. de Villiers Roos Collection

- Auditor-general of the Union of South Africa from 1918-1929, as well as journalist, secretary of the Judicial Department of Transvaal, Secretary of Justice and director of Prisons.
- personal archives, photo albums and maps.

2. The Struggle History Collection

- Rumpff Collection Frans Lourens Herman Rumpff was Chief Justice of South Africa from 1974 to 1982.
 - court proceedings pertaining to the 1956 Treason Trial, the 1964 Johannesburg station bomb trial, and the Delmas Treason trial of the 1980s, as well as a compilation of works done by Rumpff (tributes, forewords, letters, speeches, opinions, facts and personal).

3. Boer War Collection

Newspaper clippings, scrapbooks, photo albums, documents.

4. Van Warmelo Collection

 97 boxes of manuscripts in South African indigenous languages on the history and traditions of various indigenous groups.



The Van Warmelo Collection


Dr Nicolaas Jacobus van Warmelo (1904-1989) was an internationally recognized anthropologist. He served as State Ethnologist for the Republic of South Africa from 1930-1969. Dr van Warmelo also sat on the Language Councils for Venda, North Sotho and Tsonga as well as the National Council for Place Names. On 23 March 1989, Dr van Warmelo received an Honorary Doctorate from the University of Pretoria.

The van Warmelo Collection, donated to the University after the doctor's death, comprises over 57 000 pages of writings, concerning different South African indigenous groups and collected whilst he was in the employment of the Department of Bantu affairs as the State Ethnologist. These include manuscripts on the Xhosa, Zulu, Swazi, Tsonga, South Sotho (Sesotho, Tswana, North-Sotho (Sepedi) and Venda (Tshivenḍa). Most of these manuscripts were written in the original indigenous language. These manuscripts include detailed information about the history, traditions, way of life, dress, laws, warfare and religion of the groups as well as the traditional life-stages that an individual goes through from birth to death. Dr van Warmelo collected this information over a period of 30 to 40 years and it forms part of his unpublished legacy, which will be invaluable to future generations of researchers. The collection also includes a number of photographs, albums, and cultural samples.



The Van Warmelo Collection

Between 2020 and 2022, the collection was digitised and is now available on UPSpace. The DLS Special Collections Unit has collaborated with SA Heritage Publishers, who have worked from the scans of the original documents and are currently translating them into English. The Ancestral Voices project is an enormous undertaking, as it involves transcribing and translating over 800 manuscripts. SA Heritage Publishers are also tracing descendants of the original authors of the manuscripts. This significant collection has preserved what was previously thought to be unwritten history, in a written form, and includes writings on clan history, traditional law, games, songs, folklore, hunting and trapping, material culture, customs, medicine, divination, and agriculture.
