Enhances Literacy

Institutional repositories (IRs) make children's literature widely accessible to students, educators and parents. By providing free or low-cost access to reading materials, IRs help break down socio-economic barriers that limit access to books and educational resources.

Accessible children's literature fosters a love for reading, improves comprehension and builds vocabulary especially for young readers in underserved communities.

Role of Children's Literature

Fosters Creativity

Children's literature within IRs often includes stories, illustrations and activities that inspire children's imaginations. Exposure to diverse narratives and creative content encourages children to think outside the box, explore new ideas and even try their hand at storytelling or illustrating.

Encouraging creativity through literature leads to cognitive development, problem-solving skills and emotional expression, essential skills for children's academic and personal growth.

Preserves Cultural Heritage

By housing culturally significant stories and folklore, IRs play a crucial role in preserving and promoting South African heritage. Many children's books available through IRs reflect local languages, traditions and values, making them vital tools for cultural continuity.

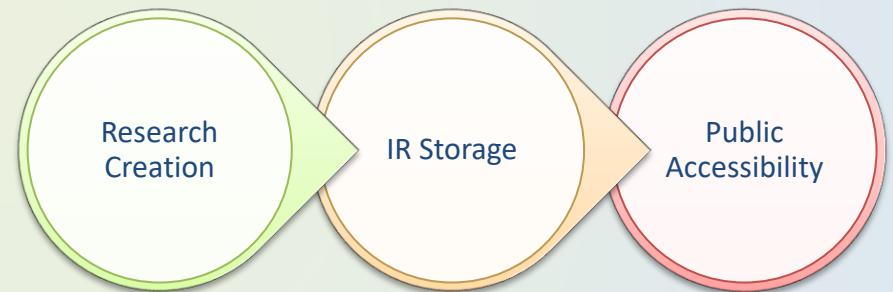
The preservation of cultural narratives ensures that children grow up with an understanding of their heritage, fostering pride in their identity and a sense of belonging within their communities. This cultural knowledge also promotes intercultural awareness and respect.

Institutional Repositories

Institutional Repositories (IRs) are digital platforms that house and manage academic resources including research papers, educational materials and scholarly publications. IRs capture and organise an institution's intellectual output, providing a centralised, accessible source for knowledge sharing and preservation (Crow, 2002; Bangani, 2018).

IRs support academic transparency and knowledge dissemination by making research accessible to a wider audience, fostering collaboration and facilitating educational advancement across disciplines.

From Research Creation to Public Access – This flowchart highlights the journey of academic resources through Institutional Repositories, underscoring their role in preserving knowledge and enhancing accessibility



Research Methodology: Comparative Case Study

Comparative case study of selected South African Institutional Repositories (IRs) with a specific focus on children's literature.

Six repositories will be chosen based on:

- ❖ Relevance to educational and public-access research
- ❖ Potential interest in preserving and promoting children's literature

1. University of Pretoria - UPSPACE
2. University of the Western Cape Research Repository
3. University of Stellenbosch IR
4. University of the Witwatersrand - WIReDSPACE
5. HSRC Research Outputs
6. SCIELO SA

Research Methodology: Case Studies

University of Pretoria - UPSPACE

UPSPACE offers extensive educational resources and focuses on academic publishing, making it a good fit for initiatives promoting children's literature as a literacy tool.

University of the Western Cape Research Repository

UWC is known for its outreach programs and could enhance education accessibility for younger age groups through its digital collection of children's literature, especially for under-represented communities.

University of Stellenbosch IR

Stellenbosch engages in publishing and educational research initiatives and supports South African cultural heritage aligning with goals to preserve children's literature.

Research Methodology: Case Studies

University of the Witwatersrand - WIReDSPACE

WITS emphasises arts, culture and heritage aligning with the preservation of children's books that reflect South African narratives and educational content.

HSRC Research Outputs (Human Sciences Research Council)

The HSRC focuses on human sciences and can provide insights into the impact of children's literature on social development enhancing comparative research.

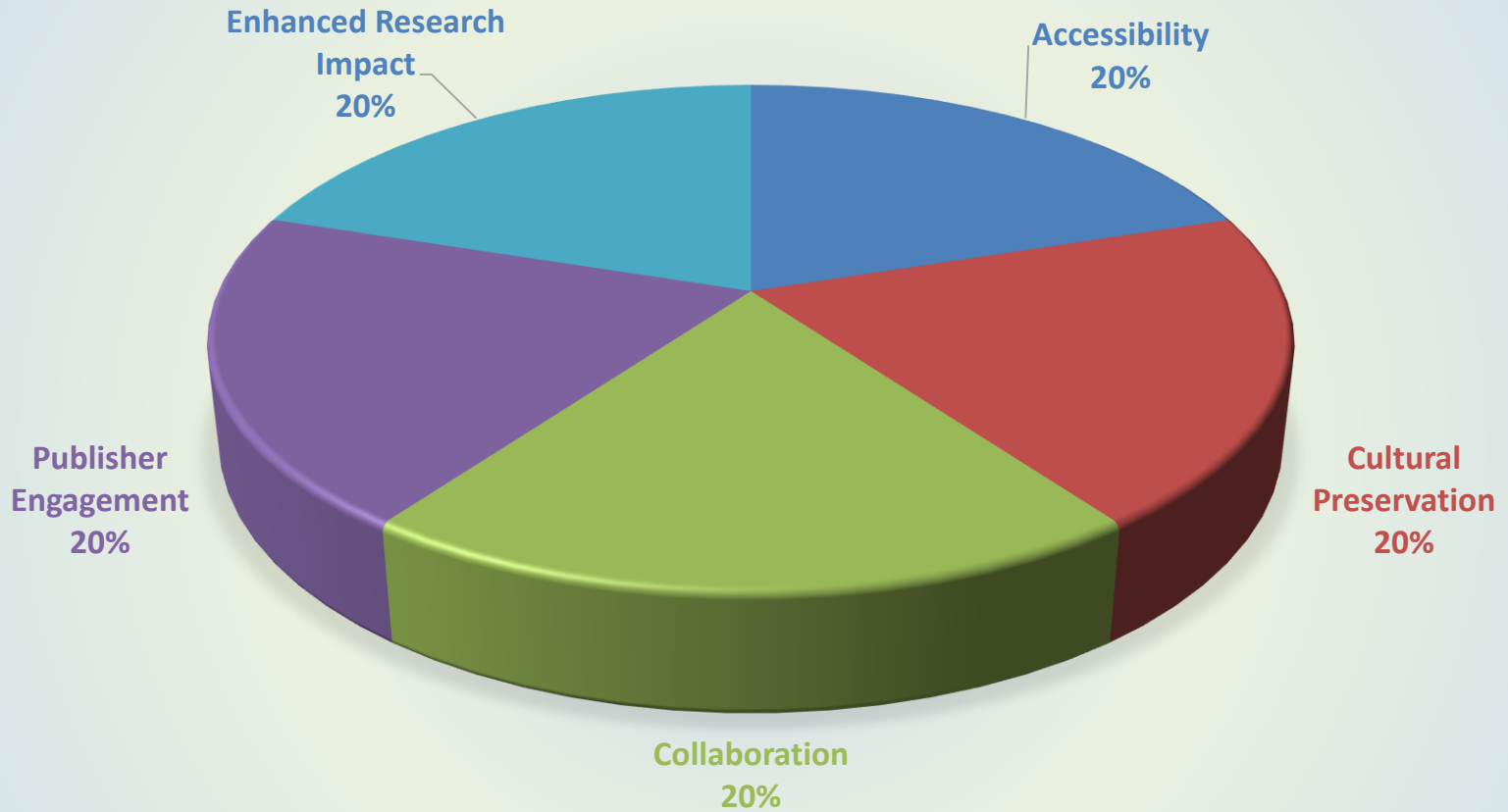
SCIELO SA

SCIELO SA is an open-access platform aimed at making South African research accessible, serving as a benchmark for the educational potential of children's literature across socio-economic backgrounds.

- ❖ **Book Dash** - Volunteers create free African storybooks that anyone can translate, print and share.
- ❖ **UNISA Children's Literature Awards** - Recognises children's authors and illustrators to inspire new talent in the genre.
- ❖ **Family Literacy Project** - Supports children's literacy by empowering parents as their children's first educators.
- ❖ **Help2Read** - A non-profit focusing on literacy and community-building through youth education initiatives.
- ❖ **Nal'ibali** - Aims to instill a reading culture in South Africa through storytelling and mobile libraries.
- ❖ **Puku Foundation** - Promotes reading by ensuring access to quality literature in all South African languages.
- ❖ **Room to Read** - Partners with schools to provide local language education and establish well-equipped libraries.

South African-based Initiatives Promoting Children's Literature

This pie chart highlights the equal benefits of institutional repositories (IRs) in enhancing children's literature through digital initiatives



Benefits of Institutional Repositories

1. **Accessibility** - Increases access to children's books in urban and remote areas.
2. **Cultural Preservation** - Digitises children's books in indigenous languages.
3. **Collaboration** - Encourages partnerships among libraries, educational institutions and cultural organisations.
4. **Publisher Engagement** - Provides publishers with a sustainable platform to archive and promote their work reaching new audiences and supporting long-term access.
5. **Enhanced Research Impact** - Increases the IRs' visibility and usage by hosting diverse, culturally relevant materials, attracting more researchers, educators and stakeholders to the repository.

Benefits of Institutional Repositories

Challenges of Preserving Children's Literature in Institutional Repositories

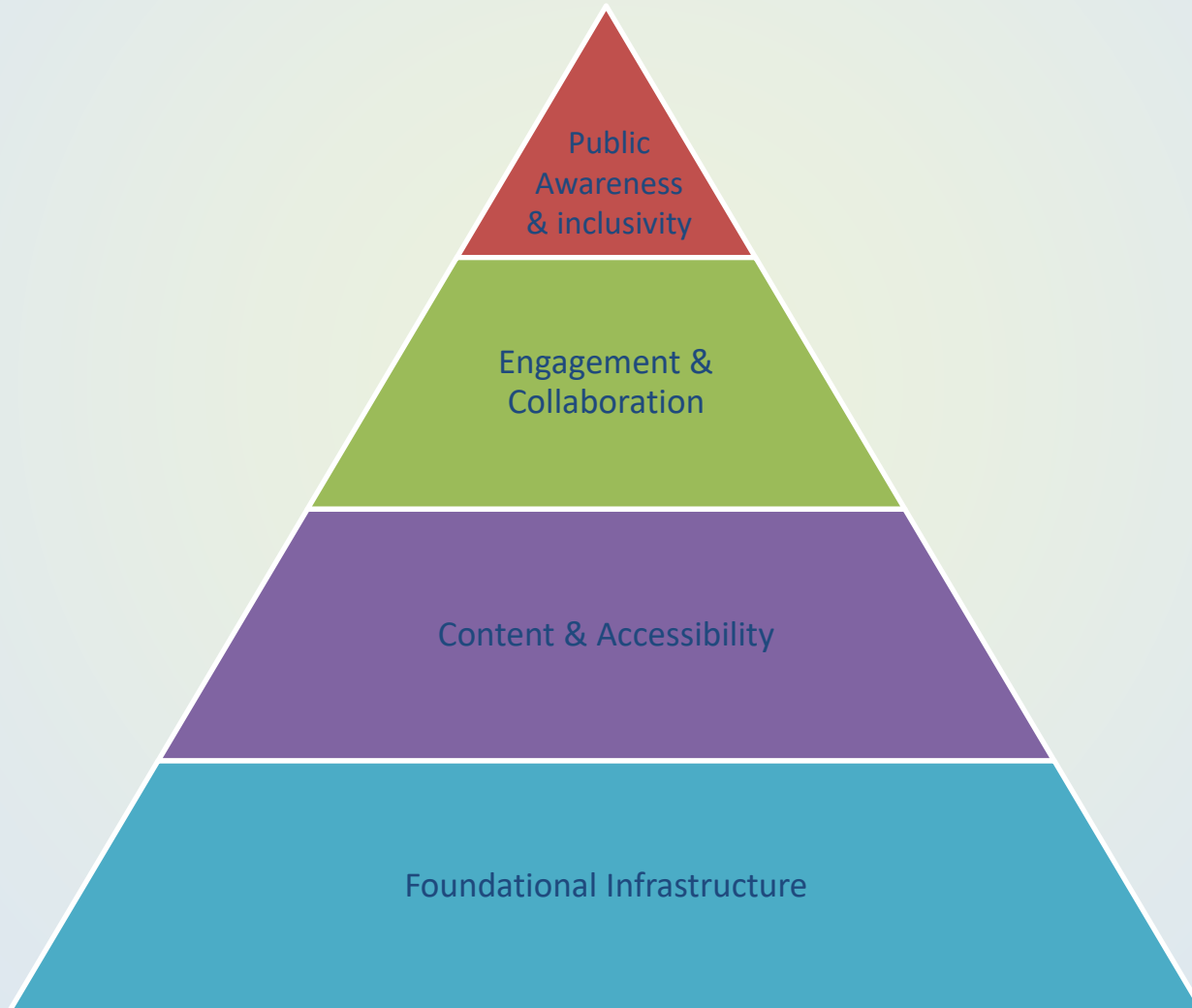
1. **Digital Infrastructure** - Limited resources in under-resourced areas.
2. **Resource Allocation** - Need for funding to support preservation efforts.
3. **Lack of Awareness** – Lack of or low awareness of IRs among educators and the public.
4. **Copyright and Licensing** - Securing copyright permissions can be complex limiting accessible content.
5. **Language and Translation** - Translating and digitising in indigenous languages requires specialised resources.
6. **Content Quality Standards** - Maintaining high-quality, standardised digital formats requires technical expertise.

Challenges of Preserving Children's Literature in Institutional Repositories

7. **Digital Literacy** - Limited digital skills may hinder user engagement with IR resources.
8. **Privacy and Security** - Ensuring secure access and protecting user data, especially for young audiences is challenging.
9. **Repository Sustainability** - Ongoing costs for storage and upgrades strain resources especially for smaller IRs.
10. **Cultural Sensitivity** - Curating diverse, culturally representative content requires careful selection to avoid bias.

Recommendations

This pyramid structure visually emphasizes that strong infrastructure and dedicated resources are foundational, enabling effective content access, collaboration, and ultimately public awareness and inclusivity.



Recommendations

Foundational Infrastructure

- ❖ Investment in digital infrastructure to strengthen technology and resources especially in under-resourced areas.
- ❖ Dedicated IRs for children's literature to create repositories specifically focused on children's content for targeted preservation.

Content and Accessibility

- ❖ Multilingual digitisation projects to ensure access in multiple languages to cater to diverse audiences.
- ❖ Flexible licensing and copyright models to advocate for adaptable permissions to expand accessible content.

Engagement and Collaboration

- ❖ Collaborative initiatives among stakeholders to partner with schools, libraries and cultural institutions for resource sharing and support.
- ❖ Digital literacy programs to train educators and users to enhance engagement and digital competence.

Public Awareness and Inclusivity

- ❖ Public awareness campaigns to raise public and educator awareness of IRs for broader reach and usage.
- ❖ Cultural representation guidelines to curate content with inclusivity standards to ensure diverse cultural representation.

Conclusion - Summary

Vital Role in Preservation and Access

- ❖ IRs preserve culturally significant children's literature, especially in indigenous languages ensuring these stories are accessible to future generations.

Supports Literacy and Lifelong Learning
