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BACKGROUND

- The Special Collections Unit dates from 1932, when it was first decided to build an Africana collection.
- Through various donations, particularly of entire, private book collections, the unit grew into what it is today.
- Our largest category of collections is our African Heritage Collections, comprised mainly of book collections, but also including some important archival collections.
- The Struggle Collection, which falls under the African Heritage Collections is a priority when it comes to our collection development and growth.



Research - The Struggle Collection

The Struggle History Collection became a consolidated collection after an audit of the individual collections we curate showed how certain collections could naturally be categorised together. This collection is one of our collection development priorities, particularly in terms of filling gaps in the collection and the decolonisation of the collections in general.

Thus far the collection comprises mainly archival collections, all of which have been digitised and are openly available on the University's institutional repository, UPSpace. However, during the course of this year we have received donations of various books and pamphlets which will also be added to this collection.

This is a unique collection with high research value and it is hoped that the consolidation, development, and improved accessibility and visibility of the Struggle Collection will generate new and diverse research projects.



Existing Collections

1. Rumpff Collection

- 3 volumes of court proceedings pertaining to the 1956 Treason Trial, a precursor to the Rivonia Treason Trial. In December 1956, 156 people, including Nelson Mandela, were arrested in a raid and accused of treason. The trial was held in Johannesburg from 1956 until 1961 and all the defendants were found not guilty. Some of these defendants were later convicted in the Rivonia Trial.
- two newspaper articles, appeal documents and the verdict of the Lesley Sikweyiya case.
- a collection of works and writings by Judge Rumpff.

Black driver's pleat to judge saves son from gallows

A 21-YEAR-OLD Black man walked free from death row in a Pretoria prison, after his father, a taxi-driver had won him an appeal hearing by making a late-might call at the home of South Africa's Chief Justice.

Lesley Sikwayiya, who watched 130 prisoners go to the gallows in his 10 months in Pretoria Central Prison, said yesterday:

"For months and months
I prayed and prayed, asking
God for my life. He gave it
to me."

Mr Sikwaviya was sentenced to death for murdering a man with a screwdriver outside a nightchub in Bloemfontein in August last year. An application for leave to appeal was rejected.

But his father, Mr Mangaliso Sikweyiya, a 49-year-old parttime minister in his local church, believed there was still hope:

"I was resperate. My wife was very illiand everything was soing wrong for my family," he said. "My lawyers told me there was not hope. The case was cut and dried."

Conflicting evidence

Mr Sikweyiya went to the Supreme Court himself and bought a copy of the court record; He studied it and made notes of what he considered was conflicting evidence.

Then he went to the Bloemfontein home of the Chief Justice, Mr Justice Rumpff.

"At first I made a fool of myself," he said I met a guard, a white man, who I thought was the judge.

The guard took him to the back of the bouse and left him with the maid. The servant said she would introduce me to Mrs Rumph, who came through and instead to my story. Hudge and instead to my story. Hudge

Rumpff arrived about an hour

"I told him about the case, he was astonished and promised fie would investigate the case," Mr Sikweyna said. Later the Appeal Court set aside the conviction.



2. Station Bomb Trial Collection

Frederick John Harris was a South African school teacher and anti-apartheid campaigner, who carried out a bomb attack on the Johannesburg railway station in 1964, in which one person was killed and 23 injured. He was tried at the Supreme Court of South Africa and was executed in 1965, the first and only white man to be executed for a politically inspired act in resistance to apartheid.

This collection consists of 5 volumes of trial transcriptions.



3. Delmas Trial Collection

The Delmas Treason Trial was one of the lengthiest political trials in South African history, running from 16 October 1985 to 18 November 1988. The trial led to the conviction of four defendants on treason charges, and seven others were convicted of terrorism, with sentences ranging from five to eleven years in prison. The Appellate Division overturned their convictions at the end of 1989.

This collection consists of 88 boxes of court transcriptions.


- 1. A speech delivered by Dr William Nkomo in July 1954, recorded on two double-sided acetate records

- 3. Various relevant books, booklets and pamphlets, a large number of which were published by the S.A. Institute for Race Relations






















Reflection - The Van Warmelo Collection

The Van Warmelo Collection comprises over 57 000 pages of writings, concerning different South African indigenous groups, collected whilst Van Warmelo was in the employment of the Department of Bantu affairs. These include manuscripts on the Xhosa, Zulu, Swazi, Tsonga, South Sotho (Sesotho, Tswana, North-Sotho (Sepedi)) and Venda (Tshivenda), the majority of which were written in the original language. These manuscripts include detailed information about the history, traditions, way of life, dress, laws, warfare and religion of the groups as well as the traditional lifestages that an individual goes through from birth to death.

The Special Collections Unit has collaborated with SA Heritage Publishers, who are currently undertaking the translation of the collection into English. The *Ancestral Voices* project is an enormous undertaking, as it involves transcribing and translating over 800 manuscripts. SA Heritage Publishers are also tracing descendants of the original authors of the manuscripts. This significant collection has preserved what was previously thought to be unwritten history, in a written form.


