#### Within the Box

Growing the income: Every year the Faculty receives significant funding from the Department of Higher Education (DHET) to support our training, which accounts to 60% of our R400 million running costs. Unfortunately, the cost of operating the Faculty is starting to exceed what our subsidy supports. As a result, we're looking at being more self-sustainable. We would love to hear your thoughts on OTAU being a commercial stud farm and for our laboratories to pulled into a new business model that runs in a similar manner to the OVAH or private clinical pathology laboratories.

Hans Hoheisen Wildlife Research Station (HHWRS): It

took a few years of hard negotiation but we're were finally successful in renewing our MOU with Mpumalanga province for a further 15 years. We're looking forward to HH now being developed into a transdisciplinary centre under the stewardship of Prof Bastos.

Renovations: As most would know, many of our facilities are close to 35 years old. Using a combination of donor funds and some reserves we're looking forward to getting the hospital floors improved, and to give our lecture halls some care and attention.

# Imploding the Box

Accreditation: Two major visits happened recently. For the first a delegation for the SAVC, AVBC and RCVS undertook a mid-term accreditation visit; while a number of laboratories went through their SANAS accreditation. In our opinion we fared well in our BVSc accreditation, with only the necropsy halls being flagged as needing attention. We were, however, commended for our teaching animal facilities and the feedlot challenge. Well done to our OTAU and PAS staff for shining on the day.

Funding Model for the Faculty: With the full support from our interim VC, the Faculty has entered into discussion with the DHET and Minister to look at the future funding model of veterinary science. If the country wants to open more veterinary schools, as per the rumours we've all heard, then it is incumbent on government to make sure that this centurion receives the proper attention.

Biosecurity: Following numerous discussions, our broader vision for the Faculty is to lead in the biosecurity sphere with focus on farmer education, vaccine development, disease diagnostics and farm-specific control strategies. We are actively engaging with various partners to established strategic partnerships that can bring funding into the Faculty to support research, postgraduate funding and locum staff.

Black-ink Signatures: Discussions with Black-ink signatures, a private donor, is progressing well. For those that may not be aware, Black-ink which has a passion for animal welfare, is looking into setting up a new animal shelter next to the Faculty with the aim of supporting our undergraduate training in animal ethology and supporting fund raising to support the welfare cases attended to by the Faculty.
