Feelings were expressed that the matter should have been discussed with other regions before. Also expressed was need for the UDF to be able to pick the right moment for certain tactics.

### 5.1.4 OBJECTIVE CONDITIONS LEADING TO FORMATION OF THE UDF

#### A BRIEF ANALYSIS

A brief analysis of conditions leading to the formation of the UDF was given. Also examined was the change in the state. Attidute towards the UDF since the National launch in August 1983. This change had been charactised by amongst others, the banning of UDF meetings and these of its affiliates and arrests of members of the front.

#### 5. I.A. 2 RESPONCE TO STATE STRATEGY

The change in the state attitude meant that the UDF

Had to seize the initiative

Had to broaden its base

Had to deepen organisation

### 5.I.4.3 REMOVALS AND RELOCATIONS

A representative of the surpplus People's project addressed 24/2/3 the N.E.C. on removals and relocations. the N.E.C. on removals and relocations.

#### SOME IMPORTANT POINTS

The following are some of the important points on the question of removals and relocations.

- (a) Bantustans benefit from removals in terms of increase of population.
- (b) Resistance to removals is increasing in areas where there are communuties as opposed to isolated famalies on farm lands.

- (c) Squater setlements have a pontential for organisation.
- (d) Unemployed rural people have nothing to loose therefore, there exist/potential for organisation.

5:1.4.4 INVOLVEMENT OF OUTSIDERS IN REMOVALS OF THE COMMUNITIES.

Examining the involvment of outsiders the following were observed -

That it was easy for outsider to undermine the people.

Progressive groups had to attend meetings when invited by communities threatened with removals and participate in debates to provide clarity.

Politicise in the rural areas were very complex reactionery groups/organisations were often viewed as progressive.

That there were local committees formed by the people to resist removals.

It was reported that a workshop on removals and relocation was being planed by the S.P.P. for December 1983.

## 6-1 REFERANDUM - COLOURDS AND INDIANS

It was noted that the YES and NO vote had become a reality. The question of the Coloured and Indian communities had to be addressed adequately.

It was reported that an interim committee had been formed in Natal by the N.I.C. and that the weekend of I2 - I3 November had been declared the Anti Constitutional proposals weekend.

It was observed that the success of the boycott campaign against the BLACK LOCAL AUTHORITIES in Soweto was going to be decisive in terms persuading the Indian and Colourds communities not to accept the Constitution, according it was decided that the UDF through its regions should ensure the success of the campaign.

## 6.1. 1 STATE STRATEGY

It was felt that the government was likely to intensify its propagands.

That they (Govt.) were likely to target rural areas were political consciousness was very low.

That cevil servants were likely to be called upon to support the "reforms" offensive.

# 6.1.2 NATIONAL CONFERENCE

Noting the series of the implications of the new constitution for the democratic movement, in particular the Coloured and Indian National groups, the N.E.C. decided to recommend to all regions that a special National Conference be held in Port - Elizabeth from I6 to I8 December 1983.

The conference would determine the UDF response to both the referundum and elections for the tri - cameral parliament for Indians and Coluords.

The National Secretariat was mandated to work out the details of the conference.

## 6.1-3 SOME SPECIFIC QUESTIONS

#### PUBLIC POSTURE

It was agreed that there existed the need for the UDF to take a particular public posture.

The N.E.C. recommended a call for a refurandum stating previos demands for the National Convention.

## L.I. L INCREASE SUPPORT

The following were suggested as way of increasing the support for the UDF.

- (a) Consultations with organistions which are not yet part of the front must be initiated.
- (b) That regions must up date the lists of their affiliates and submit some to general secretary by November I6 1903.
- (c) That General Secretary compile and compare lists submitted by regions with the list of organistions registered in Cape Town on 20 August 1983.
- (d) That subcommittees of three members per region be recommended for purposes of facilitating consultations.

# 6.15 INTERNATIONAL SUPPORT

Invitation extended to the National publicity secretary by the Dutch church groups was accepted.

It was recommended that information about the UDF be made available to agencies for publicity abroad.

## L.L. SIGNATURE CAMPAIGN

It was decided that a million signature campaign must be initiated.

(a) HOW CAMPAIGN COULD BE USED EFFECTIVELY

It was stated that the campaign had:

- To be built into organistional work.
- To be used to strengthen organisations
- A vital propaganda value.

#### (b) OTHER DETAILS

Regions were requested to "work out the practicalities" of the campaign.

- To present their proposals beofre the conference scheduled for for P.E. in December.

IT was recommend that the campaign starts at the biginning of January 1984 and the end of April 1984

### ball IDEOLOGICAL IMPACT

To create an ideological impact of the UDF the N.E.C. recommended the following

- (a) Letters be written to the commercial press by the UDF members and symbolic persons supporting the Front.
- (a) Symbols such as budges, T Shirts, UDF colours, calendars etc be used.

G.J.L.3 TRAINING

It was decided that the National Secretariat must recommend that regions set up training committees. The task of the committees amongst others would be to identify areas were training is needed, plan programmes which would include the UDF documents.

### 6.4.6.4 CONSTRIPTION

The Western Cape Region was instructed to form a commission on the question of constription.

It was decided that the youth organisations affiliated to the Front be encoura to spearhead the campaign.

The General Secretary was instructed to make available to the Western Cape Region all affiliated youth groups.

It was decided that :

- (a) A follow up letter be written to the Prime Minster.
- (b) Applications for passport by N.E.C. members be made.

Natal will make available to regions and H/O video of the people rally.

# 7.3. | TRANSVAAL

Transvaal Region reported that its POA had been implemented. That included -

- Mass meetings in varios centres.
- Workshops.
- Publication by affiliates eg. YCS.
- About 5 000 and 6 000 copies of UDF news Volume no. 3 had been confisticated but were later returned by the Police.

Letter from Azania Trust requesting leterature and articles about the UDF was presented.

ICSA

Icsa's relationship with the UDF was reported as being of non-affiliation.

## 7.3 3 BURAL AREAS

It was reported that people continue to be forced out of the historical lands by the state and Bantustans.

- Those resisting removals had their passes and houses burnt out.
- It was very difficult to organize in rural areas.
- UDF MUST ADDRESS THE PROBLEM OF SURV IVAL OF THE REMOVED AND RELOCATED COMMUNITIES.

## 7.4 EASTERN CAPE

The Eastern Cape would submit typed, report to General Sacretary.

## 7.4.1 UDF LAUNCH IN P.E.

Consultations were reported to be at advanced stages. It was stated that the Eastern Cape region was considering to Launch the UDF region on 4 December 1983.

A request was made for comrades, Lekota, RD. Naidoo and Dr. Allan Boesak to be speakers at the Eastern Cape Taunch on 4 December 1983.

## 7.4.3 MATTERS ARRISING

Eastern Cape was not receiving enough UDF News. Western Cape stated that in view of the expansion of the region they were not going to cope with the burden of catering for Eastern Cape in the future.

Eastern Cape was asked to forwad their budget for the launch and also to state how much they could raise on their own.

It was repoted that the Western Cape region had already started organising part of the Northern Cape. It was therefor going to be difficult to differentiate between Nothern Cape and the part that constitude Western Cape part. The National secretariat was mandated to investigate the dermacation of the Northen Cape.

A report from the General Secretary was received. The repoert included developments in the Border, OFS, and the Northern Caperegions.

#### 10 PUBLICITY SECRETARY

## 10.1 MEDIA AND DIPLOMATIC MATTERS.

Report from the Publicity secretary was recieved. In his report he expressed concern at the irregularities regarding the production of UDF news, eg. Natal had not been able to produce second issue of the UDF news in time whilst Cape Town could not print it at all.

He reported significant progress in terms of relations. with news papers, the media in general and also on the diplomatic plane.

# 10. 2 OFFICE AND PETTY CASE


The publicity secretary reported that he would move into a new office in Durban and that Petty cash, typewriter would be required.

## 10.3 TRANSVAAL AND PUBLICITY

A joint press conference and a solidarity mass meeting was held. ## 6. NGOYA UNIVERSITY KILLINGS:
