University of Utrecht: IVY Academic Search: Veterinary Science and Medicine

We have heard the welcoming news that the Veterinary collections of the University of Pretoria's Open Access Institutional Repository, UPSpace, have now been added to an open access subject repository of the University of Utrecht: Ivy Academic Search: Veterinary Science and Medicine. As they state on their webpage http://www.ivyacademicsearch.org/about_ivy.php, their mission is to:

"provide the local, national and international veterinary community with a high-quality academic information search and retrieval system for veterinary research."

This will contribute to the further exposure of our Faculty's research output as well as all other valuable digital veterinary science collections currently part of UPSpace.

One of the advantages of using the University of Utrecht's Ivy Academic search facility is that a central point is provided to search the open access repositories of all participatory Veterinary Institutions

Search results can be printed, e-mailed, saved or exported to Refworks. We are proud to contribute to this initiative of the University of Utrecht.

Carnegie Research Libraries Consortium Project

The Carnegie Corporation of New York has awarded an extension grant of \$2.5m to expand the Research Libraries Consortium's (Universities of Cape Town, KwaZulu-Natal, Witwatersrand, Rhodes, Pretoria and Stellenbosch) three-pronged model for enhancing research support in South Africa. These are:

- The creation of Research Commons, which are dedicated spaces for post-graduates and researchers in each of the RLC libraries;
- Development of Library Skills to support research i.e. to strengthen and upgrade the skills of the Information Specialists thereby enabling them to provide top class services to researchers efficiently and effectively;

- Implementation of the Research Portal that will enhance the capacity to manage electronic journals, linking directly to full text, and searching across multiple databases through the installation of PRIMO discovery software, SFX, Metalib and other related software in the libraries of the RLC.

The Research Libraries Consortium recruited pioneers to implement and further the vision of expanding and enhancing support to researchers. Six candidates from each of the three new partner libraries namely, Rhodes, Pretoria and Stellenbosch, and two from University of Johannesburg were selected to attend a two-week residential academy from 11-23 April 2009 at the Mont Fleur Conference venue near Stellenbosch. Candidates who successfully complete the South African Academy will be eligible for selection to participate in an intensive six-week internship programme in the United States in 2011.

These training and internship interventions are aimed at producing a new cadre of Research Librarians at each of the participating Universities and hence collaboratively across the Consortium. These specially trained librarians will have a unique opportunity to share and develop their own knowledge and expertise, and deliver innovative, research-intensive services based in the Research Commons and Research Portal environment being developed by the Project.

Two of our staff members applied and were selected for this wonderful opportunity! Tertia Coetsee will attend the first Academy in April and Marguerite Nel in October 2010.

Anti-Plagiarism Campaign at the library 2010

The UP Department of Library Services ran an Anti-Plagiarism campaign on campus during the week of 15 – 19 February 2010. The Jotello F. Soga Library took part in this campaign with an exhibition in the library that highlighted the essence of plagiarism and how to avoid it and also distributed marketing material on plagiarism.

The University regards plagiarism as a serious offence and has tabled a policy on Plagiarism that has been approved by Senate in 2009. This policy is applicable to all members of the University community. The policy provides clear guidelines on several aspects and responsibilities with regard to Plagiarism.

The library has a clear responsibility to make clients aware of the dangers of plagiarism and to give guidance on avoiding plagiarism through the use of proper referencing techniques.

You must be a registered student/staff member to access library resources.
 You need to type your student/ personnel no. (without the P or S) and PIN.
 If you do not have a PIN or forget your PIN: click on the "Request a new PIN" link.
 Keep your PIN confidential at all times. If there are more than five failed attempts for a user, the account will be locked for 15 minutes.

Two new journal indicator products: SNIP & SJR

Journal indicators are being developed to **assess** the quality and impact of scholarly journals within the scientific community. The pioneering one is the journal impact factor, which has grown into the most widely used tool for ranking journals in scholarly publication. This was developed by Eugene Garfield at the Institute for Scientific Information (ISI), nowadays Thomson Reuters.

Advancements in technology, research and communication are creating the need to examine data from new perspectives. Recently 2 more journal indicator products are developed.

Balancing the scales:

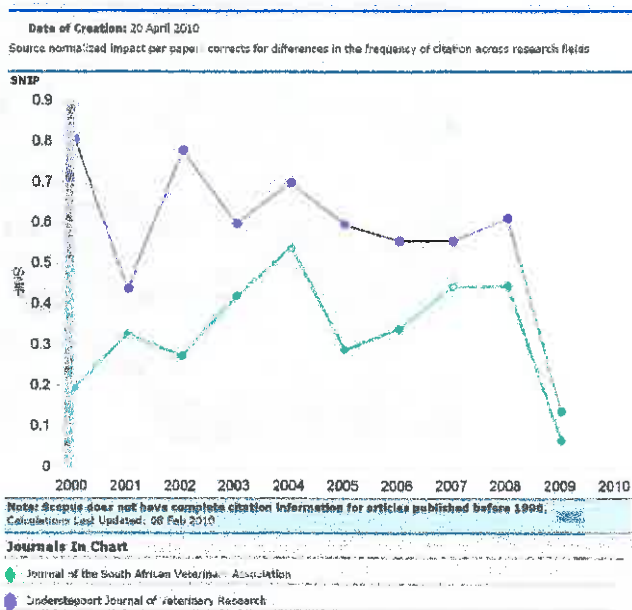
The **Centre for Science and Technology Studies (CWTS)** of Leiden University developed an indicator called the Source Normalized Impact per Paper. This indicator can be seen as an important alternative to the impact factor.

SNIP(Source Normalized Impact per Paper)

Created by Professor Henk Moed at CTWS, **SNIP** measures contextual citation impact by weighting citations based on the total number of citations in a subject field. The impact of a single citation is given higher value in subject areas where citations are less likely, and vice versa.

SNIP

- Measures contextual citation impact by 'normalizing' citation values



- Takes a research field's citation frequency into account
- Considers immediacy - how quickly a paper is likely to have an impact in a given field
- Accounts for how well the field is covered by the underlying database
- Calculates without use of a journal's subject classification to avoid delimitation
- Counters any potential for editorial manipulation

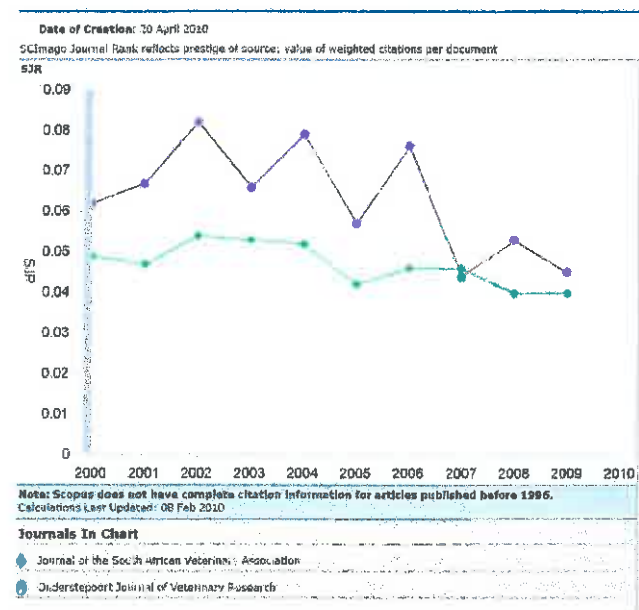
The power of prestige:

SJR (SCImago Journal Rank)

Developed by Professor Félix de Moya, Research Professor at Consejo Superior de Investigaciones Científicas, SCImago Journal Rank (**SJR**) is a prestige metric based on the idea that 'all citations are not created equal'. With SJR, the subject field, quality and reputation of the journal has a direct effect on the value of a citation.

SJR

- Is weighted by the prestige of the journal, thereby 'levelling the playing field' among journals
- Eliminates manipulation: raise the SJR ranking by being published in more reputable journals
- Shares' a journal's prestige equally over the total number of citations in that journal
- Normalizes for differences in citation behaviour between subject fields

About libraries and books...

J A Langford once remarked that "The only true equalisers in the world are books; the only treasure-house open to all comers is a library; the only wealth which will not decay is knowledge; the only jewel which you can carry beyond the grave is wisdom." Nowadays we are starting to think differently about libraries and books. Today, for most of us, the library is the electronic page, opening on your own laptop or PC when you need information. Many students and researchers prefer the luxury of fast, immediate and easy to access information enabled by Information Communication and Technology's. But so many library users still prefer books.

With the effect of the global economic crisis and new directions in library collection development, it will be interesting to look at the situation regarding book acquisitions in the Jotello F Soga Library, over the last few years.

Veterinary Science books are expensive. *Figure 1* gives an indication of the average price of the books in the different departments of the Faculty of Veterinary Science (UP) for the year 2008. It is important to mention that these figures are only for books ordered at the Jotello F Soga Library during 2008.

Another interesting issue to look at is the amount allocated for the acquisition of books at this library as well as the total amount of orders placed.

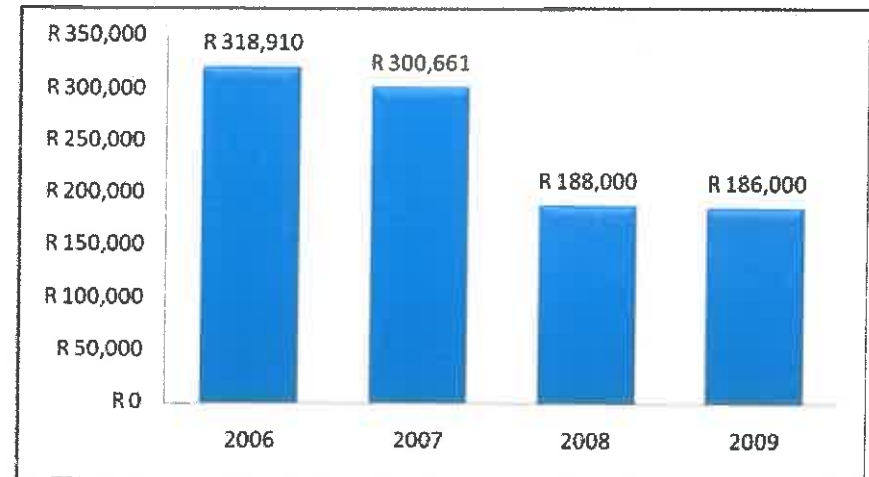


Figure 2: Book budget for the Jotello F Soga Library for the period 2006 – 2009

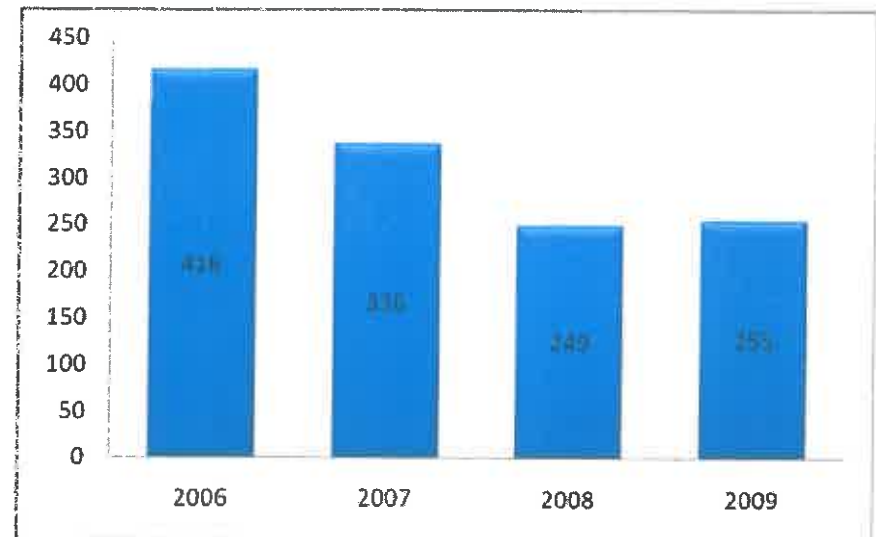


Figure 3: Total amount of book orders placed by the Jotello F Soga Library for the period 2006 - 2009

This information is displayed in Figure 2 and 3 respectively. It is interesting to note that although there was a large decline in the average book budget over the period 2006 to 2009 (almost 40%), the total amount of books bought declined less.

This can be that we ordered only one or maximum two copies of more expensive works or tried to buy less expensive titles. It will however be interesting to further investigate this phenomenon.

Although the electronic world of information became a crucial part of our world, it is difficult to imagine a library without books. And, with a library budget of R 178 000 for 2010, we promise to spend it wisely to meet all your information needs.
