



From the Dean's Desk



Gedurende die jaar wat verby is, is ons Fakulteit deur 'n vloed van oorsese wetenskaplikes en opvoeders besoek. Met politieke boeie uit die weg geruim is daar hernieude belangstelling in wat ons hier het en wat ons kan aanbied. Onderstepoort se mistiek het 'n trekkrag. Die sterk tradisie van kundigheid wat oor baie jare opgebou is en met die naam Onderstepoort verbind is, is deel van daardie mistiek. Gestig in 1920, is ons Fakulteit die oudste van die 28 in Afrika. Buiten Khartoum, Soedan (1938) en Kairo, Egipte (1946) is al die ander fakulteite na 1960 gestig. Dit gee vir ons 'n vaderfiguur-beeld wat ons in 'n besondere voordelige meedingende posisie plaas.

Elke keer dat ek saam met ons besoekers deur die Fakulteit stap word ek opnuut met 'n borrelende trots vervul. Ons het iets besonders - ons mense, ons geboue, ons gronde. Ons mees onlangse besoeker, prof Akira Takeuchi van Japan, het dit in die volgende woorde opgesom : *"You have one of the finest veterinary schools I have visited - and so much space!"*.

Hoe maklik gebeur dit dat ons wat so na aan dinge staan, dít wat ons besoekers met ontsag inboesem, nie meer raaksien nie? Ons moet tyd maak om vir 'n oomblik terug te staan, stil te staan, sodat ons ons fantastiese geriewe kan waardeer. Daar is min fakulteite in die wêreld wat het wat ons het.

But winning faculties are not just made up of fine buildings and sophisticated equipment; it is the people within those facilities that determine its stature. People with energy and enthusiasm, a dedication, hope and vision and above all perhaps, a commitment. These are the characteristics that separate success from failure, that remove the barrier between mediocrity and excellence. We have those sort of people in abundance.

A winning academic institute functions as a team. There is a synergism between all members of staff and the students. An integration of effort which relates one discipline to another, recognising the relevance of each. There must be the establishment of mutual trust, for this is the corner stone required to establish a feeling of security within

the system. A security which engenders a tolerance which recognises and lifts our talent, while bolstering areas of deficiency.

The turbulent times in which we find ourselves bring doubts and fears and disillusionment. Change is inevitable and indeed under "normal" circumstances at a moderated and controlled pace essential for growth and development. Under the volatility of the changes going on around us, however, a feeling of uncertainty must prevail.

"What is the future of veterinary science?" is a question frequently posed. Two committees, one a subcommittee of the Advisory Committee of Universities and Technicons (AUT) and the other a commission of the ANC are currently busy with investigations which are attempting to provide answers to the question. Fortunately both committees recognise that veterinary science has an essential role to play in the future development of our country. This in itself augurs well and the fact that we are being called upon to make inputs into the deliberations is further reason for optimism. What the veterinary profession contributed to agricultural development and the economy of the country at the turn of this century, the modern veterinarian will be called upon to do, but over a far wider spectrum, as we move into the new century. The potential plagues that plundered production of livestock in days gone by, continue to remain a threat against which we must guard. Add to this the vast new component of the companion and sport animal industry, a component that will not disappear overnight as we enter the new South Africa, and we have a great deal to plan for.

We have, I have no doubt, the mettle, commitment and ingenuity to remain relevant to whatever demands the new South Africa will place on us. It is not a case of what the new South Africa holds for us, but rather what do we hold for the new South Africa. With this as our driving force we can largely determine the nature of our future.

'N STORIE OOR 'N WOELIGE DAME

Christine van Vuren -

Gedurende die vroeë dertigerjare - die tyd van die groot droogte en die depressie - en om presies te wees, op 27 Februarie 1933, is 'n dogtertjie op Potchefstroom gebore. Haar ouers het haar Maatjie, Marie, Sophie (Malie) gedoop.



In die Laerskool Pretoria-Oos het dit op akademiese gebied baie goed met haar gegaan. Sy het graad 1 en 2 sommer in een jaar kafgedraf. Die enigste "afwyking" in die andersins koersvaste en onbesproke kind se skoolloopbaan is 'n twyfelagtige opmerking deur haar juffrou op haar standerd 2 rapport : "*Malie is woelig en ongehoorsaam!*"! Wat die "woelig" aanbetrif het die juffrou die spyker op die kop geslaan! Wat sy met die ander opmerking bedoel het sal seker net die juffrou en Malie weet.

Aan die einde van haar standerd 5-jaar verhuis die gesin na Kaapland en voltooi Malie standerd 6 in 1945 in die Strand. Die res van haar hoërskoolloopbaan bring sy deur aan die Hoër Meisieskool Bloemhof in Stellenbosch.

Vir watter tipe loopbaan sou sy haar bekwaam? Om verpleging of onderwys te studeer - soos die meeste meisies van daardie jare - het Malie nie kans gesien nie. So gebeur dit dat Malie in 1950 inskryf as eerstejaar aan die Universiteit van Stellenbosch met die oog op keuring tot Veeartsenkunde op Onderstepoort. In 1954 word sy die 5de vroulike veearts in Suid-Afrika en verower sy ook die Theiler-medalje. Nie verbasend nie; die meisiekind het dan al in graad 1 bewys dat sy 'n slimkop is.

In 1955 gaan werk sy as assistent in die kleindierpraktyk van Faull & Burgess. Ook nie vir te lank nie, of die "berugte woeligheid" steek weer kop uit. Om van al die opgekropte energie ontslae te raak, sluit sy op 'n vrywillige basis aan by 'n groep genaamd "Morele Herbewapening" - 'n idealistiese groep jongmense wat die wêreld wou verander, daarvan 'n beter plek wou maak!

Om aan haar idealisme gestalte gee gee reis sy vanaf 1956 tot 1969 saam met Morele Herbewapening deur Europa, Amerika, Oos-Afrika en Suider-Afrika. In Switserland en op Mackinac Island in Michigan leer Malie om kos te kook vir 1000 mense, tafel te dek en hoe om koninklikes, arbeiders, studenteleiers van Japan en Suid-Amerika, kommuniste uit die Ruhr gebied van Duitsland en nog vele andere te bedien. Agter die skerms help sy met die aanbieding van teaterstukke en tree self op in 'n internationale koor wat elke afvaardiging met hul eie volkslied verwelkom. Sy ken nou nog die woorde van die Sjinese volkslied (seker al die ander ook!).

In 1970 keer Malie terug na Onderstepoort en word sy aangestel as lektor in die Departement Anatomie. In 1976 promoveer sy aan dieselfde Universiteit met 'n proefskrif getiteld "*The Blood Vessels of Cervical Vertebrae of the Ox*". Haar binne- en buitenlandse eksaminatore ken 'n gemiddelde punt van 90 % toe aan dié DVSc graad! In dieselfde jaar word Malie ook genomineer as "Star Woman of the Year".

In die Europese winter van 1977-1978 besoek Malie agt Anatomie Fakulteite in Europa

om 'n studie te maak van die metodes van onderwys in anatomie. Sy besoek ook Israel vir die eerste keer. In 1979 word sy deur die Vroue Veearts-Vereniging van die Amerikas genomineer as "Outstanding Woman Veterinarian of the Year". In 1982 word sy "Professor Malie" en Hoof van die Departement Anatomie.

In Augustus 1982 begin Malie se Kameelreis - of is dit rit? Deur bemiddeling van Israeli-studente wat as buitelanders op Onderstepoort studeer, word sy deur prof Daniel Cohen, Direkteur van die Woestynnavorsingsentrum van die Ben-Gurion Universiteit van die Negev, genooi om vanaf Augustus 1983 tot Augustus 1983 as gas van die Universiteit die anatomie van die Dromedaris te boek te stel. Dié boek, *Anatomy of the Dromedary*, waarvan prof Braam Bezuidenhout die medeouteur is en waarvan die sketsdeur die Amerikaanse biome-diese kunstenaar Davis Mazirsky gemaak is, verskyn in 1987.

In 1986 versoek sy dat 'n roterende hoofskap ingestel word om haar sodoende vry te

stel van administratiewe pligte. Persoonlike kontak met studente bly haar grootste belangstelling.

In 1987 word sy genomineer as "Pretorianer van die Jaar".



In 1988 begin nuwe woelighede wanneer Malie begin draaiboek skryf vir opvoedkundige videos. Gedurende 1988 tot 1991 voltooi sy vyf videos. Sy word hierin bygestaan deur Christine van Vuren (grafiese kuns en modelle) en die tegniese span van die Afdeling Onderrigme-

dia, U.P. Twee van hierdie videos, "*The Hoof*" (1989) en "*A Journey through the Intestinal Tract of the Horse*" (1992) word bekroon met die Ad Educandum-toekenning vir die beste tersiêre opvoedkundige video in Suid-Afrika. Of die videodraaiboekskrywery, óf die feit dat die studente haar "tannie" begin noem, gee aanleiding daar toe dat sy 'n kinderstorie, "*Karel "D" Kameel*", vir die SAUK Radio-kinderprogram, "Simbamba", skryf en dit word in November 1992 uitgesaai.

En nou tree Malie uit. Dis nou uit die Departement Anatomie op Onderstepoort, maar definitief nie af nie!

Glo dit as jy wil, behalwe vir al die oorsese reise wat net om die draai lê en al die ander interessante nuwe dinge waarmee dié dame haar besig gaan hou, gaan Tannie Malie op uitnodiging van die SAUK nóg kinderstories skryf!

Malie - of jy nou op 'n volgende buitelandse reis is, in Kaapstad of op Bettiesbaai, ons beste wense vergesel jou waar jy jou ook al vorentoe mag bevind.

THE CANINE CONNECTION

PROF SAREL VAN AMSTEL submitted the following :

"PINKEL, my constant companion, died on February 17, 1993 of cerebral babesiosis. For 7 ½ years he came to the Faculty on a daily basis and was an accepted "mem-

ber" of the medicine staff (see photo). During his heyday (1985 - 1987) he was widely regarded as the "champion dog" of road running. During 1986 he appeared on the 20:00 TV news and was featured in many newspapers and in the TV programme 50:50 he was the centre character in a controversy with the SPCA as to whether dogs are anatomically and physiologically made to run. All this publicity arose from his attempt to register for the 1986 Comrades marathon which was later refused on a technicality. The organising committee discovered that he had four legs and according to them only two legged mammals are allowed.



Through this newsletter I would like to thank all those faculty members who expressed an interest and sympathy during Pinkel's illness. In particular I would like to thank Dr Heidi Schroeder, Prof Wayne Berry, Dr Andrew Leisewitz, Dr Helen Griffin, Sr Maryke Harteved, Sr Andriette Whittal, Esté Borchard and the students

Both the Departments of Parasitology and Infectious Diseases have merged to form Veterinary Tropical Diseases. The new Head is Prof Bob Connor, who worked with the regional tsetse and trypanosomiasis control programme for Malawi, Mozambique, Zambia and Zimbabwe until recently.

Bob has been involved in research and field work throughout Africa since 1974 in countries which include Tanzania, Kenya, Uganda and Somalia. His most recent position was as regional expert of the Southern African Development Community's EEC-funded Regional Tsetse and Trypanosomiasis Control Programme.

A member of the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons, British-born Prof Connor has a doctorate in Veterinary Medicine from the University of London. He also studied and lectured at the University of Liverpool.

BEYOND OP

SOME PEOPLE WEAR "MANY HATS" AND JOHNNY VAN DER WALT IS ONE OF THOSE FOLKS. HE IS A PROFESSIONAL UNDERWATER DIVER. IN DECEMBER 1992 HE DIVED IN THE EMERALD LAKE AT CANGO CAVES AND SHARES HIS FIRSTHAND EXPERIENCE WITH US.

The Cape section of the South African Spelaeological Association undertakes an annual caving expedition to the Cango area and this year, members of the Transvaal section were invited to join them. I jumped at the chance to see some of the caves in the Cango area (and, who knows, maybe see something of Cango 2 and 3?). Organising a dive in a cave is never an easy task, but this one was complicated by several factors. In the first place, my diving buddy (Dick Howell) was only arriving on Wednesday, whereas the rest of us had arrived on the previous Sunday. Secondly, it took 2 days to arrange the necessary permission from the authorities



As I had taken the chance to snorkel in the lake earlier that week, I could sketch the outline of the sinkhole for Dick and decide which route to follow. We also had the benefit of the original file loaned to us by the Town Clerk, in which the first exploration of the lake by the divers from Northern Transvaal in 1964 was described in great detail. We decided to take the middle tunnel, as the bottom of the sinkhole appeared to be choked by road rubble, and top, shallow cave appeared to link up with the rest of the system anyway

We had decided to penetrate the system together, using personal reels, as the chambers

that were glimpsed during the snorkel reconnaissance were large enough to accommodate 2 people, but were too twisty to contemplate line being fed from the side. We left the rocky edge and immediately ran into heavy deposits of a fine silt that billowed up and remained suspended. We realised that if we were going to accomplish anything, it would have to be at speed; to hesitate is to become blind. Looking behind you was like watching the pyroclastic flow from a volcano roll down the mountainside towards you (and just as terrifying).

Despite our careful preparation, a problem struck early on, almost causing us to cancel the dive. I was leading the penetration, and Dick was handling the reel, which promptly jammed. As I turned around to see what the problem was, I was engulfed by the rolling cloud of silt. I clipped on to the jammed reel, and Dick and I proceeded tentatively down the slope, still engulfed by silt. Luckily, we broke clear of the cloud before encountering any obstacles, and could again proceed with absolute clarity of vision When we reached the jammer reel, Dick took over the retrieval of that rope, while I remained clipped on. At this stage, all that could be seen was the dim glow of the lights, and nothing else As a result of having to coil the rope, hold his main light, and feel for the openings, he needed about four hands, which must have materialised from somewhere, because we emerged from the tunnel after about 15 minutes into the main lake.

PROF CHARLES (CHUCK) SHORT is a Visiting Professor in the Department of Pharmacology and Toxicology. Prof Short is Head of the Department of Physiology, Pharmacology and Toxicology at Louisiana State University's Veterinary School. He is also Director of the Basic Research Program at the same University. He was a founder member of the American Academy of Veterinary Pharmacology and Therapeutics and sits on the editorial board of a number of scientific journals.

He does extensive drug development research on behalf of pharmaceutical companies and has already attracted contracts over \$300 000. He is the author or co-author of 86 scientific publications. During his stay of five months he will present papers at various congresses as well as at the Faculty and will be involved with a fairly extensive pharmacokinetic trial on the use of ketoprofen in horses.



At the upcoming World Small Animal Veterinary Congress to take place in Durban in 1994, a session will be devoted to current aspects and latest research into canine babesiosis.

RESEARCH

Various research areas continue to make strides. These include vector specificity (Banjo Penzhorn and Brychan Lewis); hemoglobinuric nephrosis (Remo Lobetti); physiological relationships of animals given blood transfusion (Andrew Leisewitz) and drug efficacy (Linda Jacobson).

Piet was with our Faculty for almost half of his 43 years, beginning with us in June 1971. Hoë Duitse eer vir professor van Pretoria

DIT is 'n eer wat geen ander Suid-Afrikaner nog ooit te beurt gevval het nie en een waarmee baie min - om presies te wees, net sewentien - ander mense van oor die wêreld heen kan spog.

Daarom is prof. Dieter Osterhoff (67) van Muckleneuk, Pretoria, besonder trots dat hy nou die agtende erelid van die Duitse vereniging vir veekunde sedert dié vereniging se ontstaan in 1905 geword het.

Prof. Osterhoff het kort ná sy aankoms in Suid-Afrika 'n bloed-groepelaboratorium op Onderstepoort begin. In dié laboratorium word vandag nog waardevolle werk gedoen met die vasstelling van onder meer beeste en perde se bloedgroepes.

Hy was van 1963 af tot met sy

aftrede hoof van die fakulteit veeartsenykunde se departement van soötegnologie. Hy praat Afrikaans, Engels, Duits, Sweeds, Frans, Noors en Deens.

Prof. Osterhoff is baie trots op die erelidmaatskap wat hy ontvang het. Dit is op die jaarvergadering van die vereniging aan hom toegeken toe hy en sy vrou, Bonnie, in Duitsland was. Hy het al talle ander toekenningstrye ontvang. Dit sluit in die goue medalje van die Suid-Afrikaanse Veterinêre Vereniging, 'n silwermedalje vir navorsing van die Suid-Afrikaanse Vereniging vir Diereproduksie en die Havengaprys vir landbou van die Suid-Afrikaanse Akademie vir Wetenskap en Kuns.

Prof. Osterhoff is in Duitsland gebore. Ná matriek en sy militêre diens het hy vir hom 'n groen Volkswagen Kewer gekoop. Die

motortjie is steeds sy belangrikste vervoermiddel.

Hy het dit saam met hom na Swede gebring waar hy verder studeer het, en in 1956 het dit saam met hom na Suid-Afrika gekom. Tot met sy aftrede twee jaar gelede het hy met die motortjie werk toe gery.

"Man het net anderdag agter my stigehou om te hoor of hy nie my motor kan koop nie. Toe ek my kop skud, het hy 'n visitekaartjie in my hand gestop en gesê ek moet hom bel as ek ooit van plan verander."

"Die motor was ook my jongste dogter, Marianne, se troumotor en my skoonseuns het al talle kere gesê ek durf nie daarvan ontslae raak nie. Op Onderstepoort het ek sommer van die begin af vir nuwe studente laat verstaan hulle kan maar na my motor kyk, maar dit is beslis nie te koop nie."
