Upholding integrity in the workplace, in research... By Susan Marsh

The phrase "value system" is often heard of in organisations and integrity is most often part thereof.

A simple definition of integrity given by Shonna Waters on Betterup's blog, a company occupied with transforming performance and growth in organisations, reads as follows:

"Integrity means being honest and having strong moral principles. A person with integrity behaves ethically and does the right thing, even behind closed doors."

Applying integrity to research is a topic of our time. The danger of unethical research practice may increase as scholars and researchers are faced with continuous pressure to publish and succeed in their careers.

The challenge for the scientific community is to identify unethical research in time, as it will result in communities losing their trust in scientific research and research results.

Dr Julia T Vilstrup Mouatt, Head of the Web of Science Academy recently announced free courses offered by the Web of Science Academy on their blog to create awareness of and improve research integrity.

Courses in the Web of Science Academy are free to access after registering on the platform. All courses consist of short modules that can be completed at one's own pace. Real world examples are used, and tips are shared from editors and industry experts. At the end of the course is a short quiz, after which learners can download a certificate of completion.

The course 'An introduction to ethical publishing behavior' covers the various ethical practices one should be aware of while conducting research as a peer reviewer or editor.

When misleading research and data discrepancies are picked up, research output is immediately retracted from a database. This not only waste resources, but result in widespread confusion and distrust amongst communities.

Dr Vilstrup Mouatt also pointed out that, even after a publication had been retracted from the database, many publications may continue to reference the article. This causes the problem to snowball.

Web of Science started to identify retracted publications with the document type: "Retracted publication". By limiting search results to this document type, unethical research results can be eliminated. The functionality "retraction alert" can be used to be informed about retracted publications in the database.

Awareness of and training in ethical and unethical research is crucial to uphold scientific excellence.




2022 Globally rankings : the 8 best universities in South AfricaBy Tertia Coetsee

The Shanghai Ranking Consultancy has published its 2022 Academic Ranking of World Universities (ARWU) highlighting what it deems to be the best 1,000 universities in the world – including nine located in South Africa.

For South Africa, the rankings have a familiar look, led by the University of Cape Town, which places inside the top 300 institutions globally. The University of the Witwatersrand is second locally, ahead of Stellenbosch, the University of Johannesburg, and the University of Pretoria.

The biggest jump among local universities is seen by UJ, which climbed into the top 401-500 institutions globally in 2022, from the 601 – 700 list.

The University of KwaZulu-Natal also climbed from the 601 – 700 list to the 501-600 list.



A new database: Altmetric Explorer

The library recently subscribed to the database "Altmetric Explorer" that allows researchers and institutions to track the attention their scholarly and scientific research output receives in the social realm.

Compared to the well-known "bibliometrics", altmetrics are non-traditional bibliometrics proposed as an alternative or complement to more traditional citation impact metrics, such as impact factor and h-index.

Altmetric Explorer is listed with all the other databases the library subscribe to and can be found on the library web page under the Search tab, Databases — Altmetric Explorer. As with the SciVal database where clients can find bibliometric data, one needs to "Sign-in" to make use of the database. The institutional e-mail address is used to sign-in, with a password of choice.

The content of Altmetric Explorer is harvested from open social sources such as open access institutional repositories, social media such as Twitter, Facebook (only public pages are tracked), You Tube, News, Blogs, Wikipedia, Policy documents etc. The processed content then provides the researcher with a collated visual view of the attention his research output receives.

The "My Institution" search option in the database where UP authors and departments can be searched, is based on the layout of faculties and departments in the UPSpace repository. Results can be found for UP as a whole, a specific Faculty or Department or an individual. The "Full database" search option will let you search all other institutions nationally and internationally that is part of the Altmetric Explorer database.

The Altmetric attention score is presented as a colourful donut where the different colours represent the different types of social media where a work is mentioned. The score is derived from an automated algorithm based on the volume and source of attention.

- Volume how often your research is mentioned
- Sources Where your research is mentioned. Each source is weighted. News receives a weight of 8, Blogs 5, Wikipedia 3, Policy documents 3, Patents 3, Twitter 1 and Facebook and YouTube 0.25.

The colour blue in the donut represents social media, red represents news and blogs, purple represents policy documents and patents and orange represents Wikipedia and videos.

Hyperlinks within the database will take you into different tabs as well as to the original content where a research output received attention, e.g. a tweet in Twitter. The database also supplies a geographic and demographic breakdown of the attention research outputs receive. Attention over time can be visualised as well. An "Alert me" functionality is available to alert a researcher of new attention received.

Searches can be saved for future reference or can be shared with a colleague via a link. Updates of saved searches can be sent daily, weekly or monthly.

Researchers are encouraged to make their research output visible on social media and through informal scientific networks to improve their altmetric attention scores.
